Introduction:

This course is part of Constitutional Law Specialization forLL.B. programme. The subject is taught to the students in the tenth semester of the LL.B. five-year integrated programme. The course encompasses various aspects of human rights introducing the learner to the concept of Human Rights and various important international legislations on Human Rights including the UDHR, ICCPR and ICESCR. The learner is also familiarized with the Human Rights pertaining to the weaker sections of the society, including women, children, prisoners and LGBTIQ, protected internationally as well as in India. Indigenous tribes and disabled human rights are also discussed in this course with help of various legislations. Lastly this course deliberates on the Protection of Human Rights Act, 1993 and role of Courts and international bodies for protection of human rights.

2. To discuss the principles and fundamental aspects of important international treaties on Human Rights.

3. To discuss the nature of human rights treaties pertaining to weaker sections of the society.

4. To discuss the nature of human rights treaties pertaining to disabled persons and indigenous tribes.

5. To deliberate on the municipal law on Human Rights in India and role of Courts in protection of Human Rights.
